Congratulations on beginning your chronological study of Genesis, the first book of the Old Testament. # How to Use This Course

As the main goal of this course is to better acquaint you with God's Word, we would encourage you to get your own copy of the Bible. Although some of the shorter passages of God's Word that will be studied are printed in the lessons themselves, the longer portions are not. Most of the lessons have preliminary reading assignments at the beginning of the main sections of the lesson, and you will need to read these portions of Scripture before beginning the corresponding section in that lesson.

Along with this introductory letter, your coach has you sent a copy of Volume 1 (containing Lessons 1-3) and a Q&A booklet for Lesson 1. Read Lesson 1, and then fill out the Q&A booklet with your answers to the questions. When you are finished, send the Q&A booklet back to your coach at the address he/she has provided. Your coach will grade your lesson and send you the Q&A booklet for the next lesson. If you have any questions regarding the lesson, feel free to write them down and send them with the Q&A booklet.

The version of the Bible used throughout *Bible First* is the King James Version (KJV), and we strongly recommend that you read the KJV as well.
